## FLAGGED COURSES

A flag is an additional attribute attached to a course. Flags may attach to courses in Integrations in the Humanities, major/minor courses, or electives. Some flags attach to whole course numbers; others only to specific sections. There are four kinds of flags:

- Diversity, Inclusion, and Social Justice
- Global Perspectives
- Writing Across the Curriculum, and
- Signature Work.

There are specific rules for which courses may carry each flag; you can use Class Finder to search for flagged classes.

## Diversity, Inclusion, \& Social Justice

Students must take four credits of coursework that carries the DISJ Flag. A DISJ course is taught at the 200 level or above. It cannot be used to satisfy any core area except Integrations in the Humanities. It can be flagged for Writing Across the Curriculum or Signature Work, but must be separate
from Global Perspectives. The course can overlap with major or minor courses. DISJ Course(s):

## Global Perspectives

Students must take four credits of coursework that carries the GP flag, or a university-recognized study abroad course with at least 20 days spent outside the U.S. A Global Perspectives course is taught at the 100 level or above. It cannot be used to satisfy any core area other than Integrations in the Humanities. It can be flagged for Writing Across the Curriculum or Signature Work, but must be separate from Diversity, Inclusion, \& Social Justice. The course can overlap with major or minor courses.

## Signature Work (Capstone)

Early in their time at St. Thomas, students should begin collecting and saving samples of their work conducted in courses or noncourse activities for their capstone Signature Work e-portfolio (ex: research reports/papers, videos or podcasts created by student, recordings of performances, documentation of service or internship activities, academic essays, study abroad assignments).
Students must earn a minimum of 80 credits prior to beginning the Signature Work course. It must be on the 300 level or above. It may be major specific. It may overlap with Integrations in the Humanities, Diversity, Inclusion, \& Social Justice, or with Global Perspectives.
