## First Year Experience

## Core-flagged Courses

- Integrations in the Humanities (8 cr) Students take two courses from academic areas that focus on understanding and integrating human experiences, cultures, values, and meaning. You will be able to choose from courses across many programs. Learn more about courses offered by the Art History, English, History, Philosophy and Theology departments.
- Writing Across the Curriculum (WAC). Four flagged writing courses: two that are writing-intensive, one on writing to learn, and one on writing within the major discipline.
- Global Perspectives (GP), 4cr. Complete one Global Perspectives course.
- Diversity, Inclusion, Social Justice (DISJ), 4 cr. Take one Diversity, Inclusion, and Social Justice course.
- Signature Work (SW), 4 cr. Take a Signature Work course.
- Some core-flagged courses (e.g., WAC courses) are approved to carry the flag based on the professor teaching the course. These are not all called out on the above 4-year plan. Work closely with your advisor to ensure that you meet all the core-flagged requirements.


## Core-area Courses

- English (4 cr). Critical Thinking; Literature and Writing. Learn more about courses offered by the English department.
- Philosophy and Theology ( 12 cr ). Everyone takes Philosophy: The Person and the Good, and Theology: Foundations. Additionally, you will take four more credits - your choice of four credits in either Philosophy or Theology (make sure the course you choose is on the approved lists).
- Fine Arts (4 cr). Classes range from Intro to Art History to Filmmaking, or 4 semesters participating in a large music ensemble
- Historical Analysis (4 cr). Options include courses like Origins of Modern World to 1550 and African American History in Global Perspectives. Learn more about courses offered by the History department.
- Language and Culture (up to 8 cr ). Students will either demonstrate competency through the 211 level of a second language or take two sequenced courses in a second language. Learn more about courses offered by the Modern and Classical Languages department.
- Natural Sciences ( 4 cr ). Learn more about courses offered by the Biology, Chemistry, Engineering, Geology or Physics departments.
- Quantitative Analysis (4 cr). Courses in mathematics or statistics
- Social Scientific Analysis (4 cr). Options range include Introduction to Sociology, Human Geography, and more.
